I can draft an introductory paragraph using what I have learned about strong introductions.

Directions: To draft your introduction for your reflective essay, you will choose to respond to **ONE** of the following writing prompts.

We have been studying about the lessons and feelings that may come from the natural world.

You will write an essay in which you:

- Reflect upon the kinds of lessons that nature may teach us
 OR
- 2. Reflect upon the types of feelings that may come from experiences in nature

To develop your essay, you will use good text evidence from <u>at least two texts</u>, AND you will use your <u>own personal experience</u>.

Remember what you have learned about effective introductions:

- Effective introductions often **open with a** *hook***,** a means of grabbing readers' attention. Hooks may include:
 - 1) a relevant quotation from a trustworthy source
 - 2) a significant or startling fact or statistic
 - 3) a relevant anecdote (a personal experience or an experience from someone else)
- Good writers should be able to **transition logically** from their hook to their thesis statement.
- Strong thesis statements offer a direct and clear response to the writing prompt.
- Strong thesis statements are **precise**, **limited**, **unified**, **and valuable**. That is, they use language that says exactly what it means. They also offer a limited, rather than a general, focus for the essay. Strong theses provide a single direction for the essay. Finally, they offer readers a valuable insight, one that results from close reading and careful thinking.
- 1. Use the prompt you have selected to draft an effective thesis statement.
- 2. Then consider an effective hook to open your introductory paragraph.
- 3. Draft your introductory paragraph.
